Minutes for November's Steering Committee meeting are now available on the UKLA website.

Adam Rusbridge attended the Online Information conference, to promote the UK LOCKSS Alliance and related journal preservation activities taking place at EDINA.

System Development

LOCKSS daemon 1.52.3 is now available – see the UKLA blog for details on how to make sure your LOCKSS box is up to date.

The LOCKSS team have made initial contact with Innovative Interfaces regarding integration of LOCKSS with WebBridge LR.

The Stanford development team are improving the implementation of plugin 'substance checkers'. An AU with substance means that all content has been collected as expected – namely, full-text PDF and HTML articles and images. Comprehensive substance checkers allow us to identify what has been collected, or has failed to collect, and thus to report on how well content has been preserved in individual LOCKSS boxes and across the network.

Quick Tips

Navigating the long lists on the LOCKSS interface can be tricky. These shortcuts make things a bit easier.

- HOME – takes you to the top of the screen
- CTRL + F – 'Find' command for searching through text, e.g. to look up the name of a particular journal
- Shift-click – Click to select an AU, then hold shift before clicking another AU to select a volume range.

Content Development

In January UKLA will release a detailed list of the journal titles and volumes preserved in LOCKSS. It will provide additional detail by including a status of 'Committed', 'In Progress' and 'Preserved' for each journal listed. December has seen further system development towards this report, with improved processing of volume and issue ranges and new functionality to support generation of KBART reports from the command line.

Please see the recent content release email for a summary of the new titles available for preservation. There are two particular points of interest:

- De Gruyter has acquired the journals published by Berkeley Electronic Press. Members who subscribe to these journals should select them for preservation as soon as possible, as the de Gruyter publishing platform does not currently participate in the LOCKSS program.
- A number of SpringerLink titles are ceasing publication, switching publishers, or otherwise leaving the platform at the end of 2011. Members who subscribe to these publications should select them for preservation as soon as possible.
