Since the last UKLA roundup, 2,871 additional archival units (volumes) were made available for preservation (with content from 17 new publishers and 199 new titles). Please see the content release emails for details.

For future content release emails the Stanford team are planning to include a spreadsheet listing the volumes made available for preservation. This is in response to UK requests and will support institutional workflows for tracking content of interest.
